## Frindle Summer Project

Welcome to sixth grade Reading! We will be reading *Frindle* by Andrew Clements this summer, and you will be creating your first project!

After reading *Frindle*, follow this packet's instructions to complete your summer project. <u>Arrive on the first day of school with this packet and your project ready to turn in, please!</u> It will be our first grade of the year.

For your project, <u>you will create a visual graffiti wall showing different elements in</u> <u>Frindle.</u> What does that mean? Well:

- 1. For every chapter in *Frindle*, <u>choose one quote (with page numbers) or one image (with page numbers) that represents that chapter.</u>
- 2. Combine these elements together on a poster, a regular piece of paper, or even a 3D diorama, if you'd like! Make sure that there is NO WHITE SPACE (except where you have quotes, so that they are readable).
- 3. Make sure that you have the BOOK TITLE, the AUTHOR'S NAME, YOUR NAME, MY NAME, and SIXTH GRADE READING somewhere on your project.

There are 15 chapters in *Frindle*. <u>That means you will need 15 elements somewhere on your project. Whether pictures or quotes, make sure each chapter is represented!</u>

Please create this project <u>by hand</u> unless you've communicated with me directly about other arrangements.

Of your 15 chapters, at least FIVE need to have direct quotes with page numbers.

Along with your graffiti wall, please create a <u>DICTIONARY ENTRY</u> for a brand-new word! Just like Nick makes up his own word "frindle", take an everyday object and give it a new name. Be sure to include:

- 1. Word
- 2. Definition
- 3. Part of Speech
- 4. Pronunciation
- 5. Etymology (how you came up with the word; its origins)
- 6. Usage examples (use it in a sentence!)
